SECTION 4 – FIRST AID MEASURES

Emergency Procedures	<p>Wear PPE in accordance with Section 8 of this SDS. With minor spills, wipe up with absorbent material (e.g., clean rag or paper towels). Collect and seal in properly labelled containers or drums for disposal.</p> <p>In the event of a major spill, prevent spillage from entering drains or water courses. Wear appropriate personal protective equipment and clothing to prevent exposure. Increase ventilation. As a water-based product, if spilt on electrical equipment the product will cause short-circuits. If possible, contain the spill. Place inert absorbent material onto spillage. Collect the material and place into a suitable labelled container. Dispose of waste according to the applicable local and national regulations. If contamination of sewers or waterways occurs inform the local water and waste management authorities in accordance with local regulations.</p>
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SECTION 7 – HANDLING AND STORAGE

Handling	Avoid skin (prolonged) or eye contact with concentrate. Wear protective clothing when risk of exposure occurs. Avoid contact with incompatible materials. When handling, DO NOT eat, drink or smoke. Keep containers closed at all times. Avoid physical damage to containers. Always wash hands with water after handling. Launder contaminated clothing before re-use.
Storage	Store in original containers in a cool, dry, well-ventilated place and out of direct sunlight. Store away from foodstuffs. Store away from incompatible materials described in Section 10. Store away from sources of heat and/or ignition. Keep container standing upright. Keep containers closed when not in use - check regularly for leaks.

Body Protection  	No special equipment needed when handling small quantities. Suitable protective workwear (e.g., apron, long sleeves/trousers, boots and cotton overalls buttoned at neck and wrist) are recommended. Chemical resistant apron is recommended where large quantities are handled.
Respirator	If engineering controls are not effective in controlling airborne exposure, then an approved respirator with a replaceable mist filter should be used.
